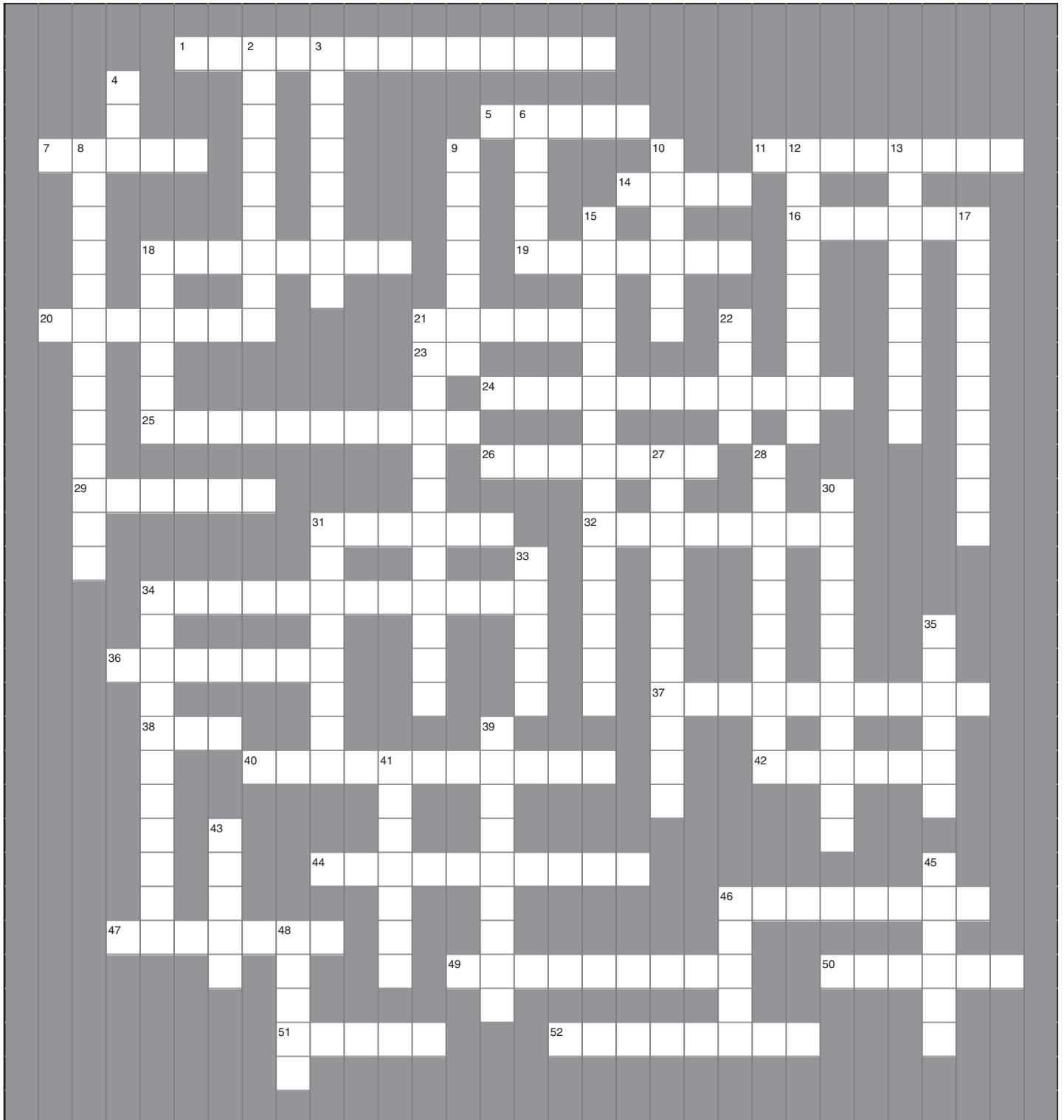


PLACES IN THE SHUSWAP CROSSWORD PUZZLE

Some of these names have been given to more than one place or geographical feature, such as rivers, towns, bays, lakes and mountains—and we have them all, right here in the Shuswap. Test your knowledge of the Shuswap, past and present, and see how many answers you can get!



ACROSS

- 1 It was here that the last spike of the C.P.R. transcontinental line was driven in 1885.
- 5 Home to a lumber mill, which processes lumber from the surrounding forests for sale and export, via the Canadian Pacific railway.
- 7 The mountains surrounding this lakeside village is home to a herd of big horn sheep.
- 11 It was here on June 1, 1906 that Billy Miner was sentenced to life. The Canadian Pacific gave a sigh of relief but Old Bill Miner spoke up and told the sentencing judge, "no jail can hold me, sir".
- 14 This Provincial Park, a small 5.9-hectare park situated on the eastern shores of the lake by the same name, was established and opened to the public in 1938 from what had once been a Relief Camp.
- 16 This lake has been overrun in recent years by yellow perch and smallmouth bass — species that are native to eastern Canada, not British Columbia — forcing a huge kill-off to prevent the wiping out native species in the lake's ecosystems.
- 18 Situated on a strip of land between two lakes, this town is named after the Secwepemc word meaning "in the middle".
- 19 This historic general store which sits between this mountain and Shuswap Lake is a migratory home to thousands of bats.
- 20 Located above Notch Hill, this mountain caught fire in 2009.
- 21 Though misspelled, it is the namesake of a subcontractor who had a camp here in 1884 while laying track for the Canadian Pacific Railway.
- 23 Not a place. The best direction to climb a mountain.
- 24 At this point, unique marble outcroppings are visible from the lake.
- 25 This park and its surrounding area of the Shuswap Highlands is renowned for it's Spring wildflowers which bloom in extraordinary profusion.
- 26 A nature lover's paradise at the north end of Anstey Arm, this lake is the only remaining low elevation, unroaded, mid-sized lake in southern B.C.
- 29 An easy 1.5 kilometer trail leads you to this beautiful canyon waterfall. The best time to visit is in the spring when its spray fills the enclosed viewing area.
- 30 These paths follow the trail of an historic 18 km waterslide for logs.
- 31 The Salmon River runs through this valley.
- 32 In the Shuswap it's a location; in Scotland it's a bonnet to be worn with Scottish Highland Dress.
- 34 Its Secwepemc (Shuswap) name, anglicized as *'hum-tat-qua'* means "something sitting in the water."
- 36 Not a place. The largest run in the world, of this type, takes place right here in the Shuswap.
- 37 The pass by the same name provides a natural corridor through the Gold Range in the Monashee Mountains, which was chosen as the CPR's route between Shuswap Lake and the Columbia River.
- 38 These hills are a popular snowmobiling, cross country skiing and horseback riding destination.
- 40 Named after the nationality of the prospectors who worked it for gold in the 1860's.
- 42 You may cross the path of seven wives on the way there.
- 44 It runs into Tappen Bay.
- 46 A 200 foot white cascade into Reinecker Creek.
- 47 It was named at a tea party after a name in a poem by Jean Ingelow.
- 49 Home of the Peruvian Horse Club.
- 50 Come winter, head to the trails and take in the beauty of this lake while cross-country skiing.
- 51 The site at this hill is being reconstructed to commemorate it's historical beginnings.
- 52 A small community that can boast of their long-standing rodeo — and 10 lakes within a 10 mile radius.

DOWN

- 2 Named after the first large-scale lumberman on Shuswap Lake. He had a logging camp here as early as 1882.
- 3 Was named after a telegraph operator, originally from England, in 1910.
- 4 The site of a large forest fire in 1998 that started from as a single lightning strike.
- 6 In this park you will find this series of five spectacular waterfalls by the same name.
- 8 Bear Creek.
- 9 The European version of the First Nations word *Secwepemc*, which refers to the people of the Secwepemc Nation.
- 10 Is it true that this the oldest hall in the South Shuswap?
- 12 Situated at the end of the highway.
- 13 It became a bustling boomtown serving travellers to the Big Bend Gold Rush in 1865.
- 15 Climb up these, which is suitable for most hikers, and the world opens to a most beautiful wide-open vista of lake and mountains.
- 17 This area is a documented archaeological site in the history of the Shuswap First Nations.
- 18 An icon of this area!
- 21 As the name implies, there are many of them here. They are Painted.
- 22 Not a place. These men fall from the skies, unassembled.
- 27 Mark Overby said that, love is much like one of these, beautiful and calm, but willing to draw blood in its defense.
- 28 Boasts an impressive 140 km of cross-country ski trails.
- 30 These paths follow the trail of a historic 18 km waterslide for logs.
- 31 Here, the First Nations trappers landed their canoes when they came to trade, which is why it was first known as Trapper's Landing.
- 33 Named after Chief Soomooloo's christian baptismal name.
- 34 The highest elevation in this area.
- 35 Come winter, snowmobilers head for this mountain.
- 39 Located on the South Thompson River, this Provincial Park is home to trumpeter swans and other waterfowl. While there are no facilities provided at the park it is still popular for canoeing, kayaking, hiking and bird-watching.
- 41 The site of the first post office — a log cabin built in 1908.
- 43 This lake was named after Ms. Charles, daughter of a Hudson's Bay Company manager during the late nineteenth century.
- 45 This provincial park takes its name from a young Vancouver physician who, in the late 1800s, realized his health was suffering from the wet coastal weather and decided to settle in the Shuswap area.
- 46 In the early days, because the stern-wheelers docked in this large bay, it was known as "Steamboat Bay."
- 48 It has a relationship with three mice and a bat.
